Reader A reading from Gospel of Matthew

After the reading, pause for silent reflection

Optional Discuss these questions in two's or three's The reading is on the reverse side.

- 1. From your own experience, discuss what is involved in forgiving someone?
- 2. Say the Our Father. Comment on the lines of this prayer that relate to forgiving.

Response	(Taken from Matthew	18:21-35)
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Side 1 "Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive? As many as seven times?"

Side 2 Jesus' answer cannot be reasoned away. There is no exception.

Side 1 "Jesus answered, 'I say to you, not seven times but seventy-seven times.'"

Side 2 As we ponder Jesus' answer, help us to take this teaching to heart.

Side 1 Jesus answered the cruel servant who was to be punished: "So will my heavenly Father do to you

unless each of you forgives your brother from your heart."

Side 2 Lord, your clear words help me to realize the seriousness of forgiving no matter the injury done

to us. Help us always to forgive.

## A Reading from the Gospel of Matthew

Peter approached Jesus and asked him,

"Lord, if another member of the church sins against me,

how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?

Jesus answered, "Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times.

That is why the kingdom of heaven may be likened to a king who decided to settle accounts with his servants.

When he began the accounting,

a debtor was brought before hum who owed him a huge amount.

At that the servant fell down, did him homage, and said,

'Be patient with me and I will pay you back in full.'
