## Introduction

Leader In our relationship with others, Jesus teaches us to go beyond the Jewish norms by acting with generosity and forgiveness—even to those who harm us.

## Opening Prayer

All Forgiving Father, how difficult it is for us to forgive those who harm us. Help us to grow in forgiving others in the spirit of Jesus whose clear, remarkable teachings compel us to be compassionate. We ask this in his name. Amen.

**Word of God** Matthew 5:38-39, 43-48

Reader A reading from the Gospel of Matthew (Pause for silent reflection)

*Optional* Discuss these questions in two's or three's. *The reading is on the reverse side.*

1. Cite an example of forgiveness of one who harmed another which exemplifies Jesus' remarkable teaching.
2. What are some personal benefits of forgiving another?

**Response** Matthew 5:38-39, 43-48

Side 1 "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you."

Side 2 Help us to forgive and pray for our enemies, which can happen only through your gift of grace.

Side 1 "If you love those who love you, what recompense will you have?"

Side 2 In our parish and other community interactions, may our love extend beyond those who love or admire us.

Side 1 "If you greet your brothers only, what is unusual about that?"

Side 2 Help us to extend hospitality within our neighborhoods and wider community.

**Petitions** Individuals add intentions to remember here.

## Closing Prayer

Forgiving God, we need your grace to forgive. May we always remember how Jesus loved even his enemies - to his death. We turn to you for support for growth in hospitality, forgiveness, and compassion. We pray in Jesus' name. Amen.

*Matthew 5:38-39, 43-48*

Jesus said to his disciples:

“You have heard that it was said,  
‘An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.’

But I say to you, offer no resistance to one who is evil.

“You have heard that it was said,  
‘You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy.’
