Response	(Taken from Matthew 13:24-30)
Side 1	"The Kingdom of heaven may be compared to a man who sowed good seed."
Side 2	May we also sow seeds of goodness, especially in our families.
Side 1	"While everyone was asleep, an enemy came and sowed weeds all through the wheat'
Side 2	When we face evil, Lord, help us to deal with it with the grace and wisdom you give to all who ask.
Side 1	"Collect the weeds firstbut gather the wheat into my barn."
Side 2	By living as your disciples, at our death may we be as wheat gathered into your eternal kingdom.
Petitions	Individuals add intentions to remember here.

A reading from the Gospel of Matthew

Jesus proposed another parable to the crowds, saying: "The kingdom of heaven may be likened to a man who sowed good seed in his field. While everyone was asleep his enemy came and sowed weeds all through the wheat and then went off. When the crop grew and bore fruit, the weeds appeared as well. The slaves of the householder came to him and said, 'Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? Where have the weeds come from?' He answered, 'An enemy has done this.' His slaves said to him, 'Do you want us to go and pull them up?' He replied, 'No, if you pull up the weeds you might uproot the wheat along with them. Let them grow together until harvest; then at harvest time I will say to the harvesters, 'First collect the weeds and tie them in bundles for burning; but gather the wheat into my barn..' "
